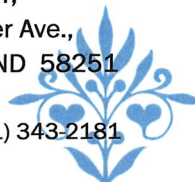

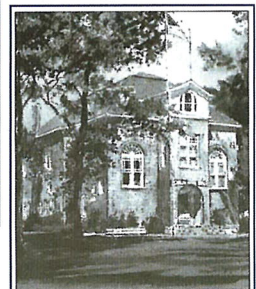

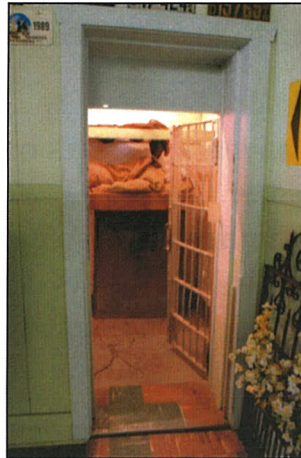

Our History

The Larimore Community Museum and Historical Association was organized in January 1967, and obtained the use of the building we are in now for our displays. The Museum Board's primary concern was to build a Museum worthy of our community and the surrounding area's great heritage. Since that time the Museum has grown and become a showpiece of local history. The City Hall Building and the Museum displays a rich history for the people of Larimore, the surrounding community, and visitors to our area, telling of the life of the early pioneers who came here to make their homes. If you listen closely, you can almost hear the echoes of concerts, weddings and dances that took place in this building.

Interesting Things to See!

Most of the displays are artifacts that have been donated by local families and share the history of the area. Some of the outstanding displays include:

- * Sewing room
- * Heirloom handwork pieces
- * A bedroom
- * Dining room
- * Furniture belonging to an early pioneer family
- * Vintage clothing and hats
- * Early lamps
- * Camera collection
- * A kitchen with artifacts spanning over a hundred years
- * An old buggy that belonged to the Larimore Family
- * A wedding gown belonging to Mrs. Jameson Larimore
- * A school room
- * Dental and medical displays
- * Fire and firefighting equipment
- * Pictures of early farms and organizations
- * Many more interesting displays

There is also a special display set aside in honor of those who served our country in the armed forces from the Civil War to present day. We also have many LHS yearbooks, local plattes, and old, local newspapers dating back into the 1800's as well as a large quantity of newspaper clippings.
